



Guide to Capital Funding

March 2024

We know that charities and community groups are always thinking about how they adapt and sustain their services to provide help and support to those in need across County Durham.

It is our aim to support organisations with funding advice by promoting all funding opportunities as they arise through our website, news bulletins, social media channels and through the continued operation of our dedicated Information, Advice and Guidance service offer.

In this guide we will provide a short introduction to capital funders, helping you to choose which funds best meet your needs and the needs of those you are supporting.

This guide is not an exhaustive list, there are other funds available and new funds are regularly released.

We will endeavour to keep the information in this guide as accurate as possible and respond to updates from funders as quickly as possible.

What can I do now?

Scenario planning and risk management are useful activities that help trustee boards to plan for an unpredictable future by considering what needs to be put in place to build on existing services or help consider how to adapt the way you work to best meet the changing needs of your beneficiaries.

Financial planning is also important, and funders might ask to see your organisational budgets and so thorough preparation of actual and projected income and expenditure as you shape your funding strategy is key.

We have identified a list of funders below who regularly provide capital grants and other funding to voluntary and community organisations in our region. Please note these funds are constantly under review and we recommend checking the individual funders' websites regularly for the latest information and updates.

[ACRE Village Hall Small Grants Fund](#)

Grants of between £2,000 and £5,000 to help make improvements to rural community buildings in England. Grants are intended to support smaller capital projects such as boiler replacements, insulation, toilet upgrades and new kitchens.

Awards can be made to cover 20% of eligible project costs, up to a maximum amount of £5,000. The balance of funding for the works proposed must be in place, or at least confirmed within 6 weeks of making an application to small grants fund.

[Ballinger Charitable Trust](#)

Ballinger Charitable Trust give grants to charitable causes working with younger and/or older people in the North East.

[BBC Children in Need](#)

BBC Children in Need is the leading independent funders for children and young people in the UK. Through their grant making and wider work, they aim to create lasting, positive change across the UK for the children and young people who need them most.

[Believe Housing](#)

Believe Housing have community funding which supports projects that make a real difference to people's lives and wellbeing. Funding is open to applications from projects within the areas Believe Housing operates in County Durham.

[Bernard Sunley Foundation](#)

Bernard Sunley Foundation is a family grant-making foundation which supports charities in England and Wales working to raise the quality of life and provide greater opportunities for the young, the elderly, the disabled and the disadvantaged. Their grants focus on capital projects.

[BIFFA Award](#)

Biffa Award gives grants to community projects near landfill sites to build communities and transform lives. You need to be in an eligible geographical area checked on their website.

[Catherine Cookson Charitable Trust](#)

The Catherine Cookson Charitable Trust awards grants in the areas of education and training, environment and conservation, arts and culture and general charitable purposes. The trustees prefer projects which involve or are directed towards capital expenditure.

[Coalfields Regeneration Trust](#)

Coalfields Regeneration Trust has a variety of programmes and funding opportunities in England focused on improving their three key themes: health and wellbeing, employment and skills. Their programmes and funding are delivered in their eligible coalfield areas which include some areas of County Durham.

[Community Foundation Tyne & Wear and Northumberland](#)

Community Foundation Tyne & Wear and Northumberland award grants to support a wide range of causes in Tyne & Wear and Northumberland, and across North East England. The grants come from nearly 300 different funds set up by their donors. You can apply as an organisation or as an individual.

Community Ownership Fund

The Government is providing £150 million over 4 years to support community groups in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland to take ownership of assets and amenities at risk of being lost. Voluntary and community groups can bid for funding to acquire important assets and run them for the benefit of the local community. The Fund will run until March 2025.

County Durham Community Foundation

County Durham Community Foundation is a local grant-making foundation that awards grants from the many funds established by their donors to try to make a lasting difference in local communities. They do this by matching your application wherever they can to the most appropriate fund available at the time. They provide grants for groups, individuals and families in need.

Durham County Council – Area Action Partnerships

Each of the 14 Area Action Partnerships (AAPs) in County Durham have a budget for local projects and investments, in addition to Neighbourhood Budgets which each county councillor has to use for local initiatives, informed by the AAPs.

Foyle Foundation

The Foyle Foundation is an independent grant making trust that distributes grants to UK based registered charities and schools. The Foundation awards funding in three main areas: arts and learning charities predominantly via the main grants scheme, small charities of all descriptions via the small grants scheme and state funded schools predominantly via the Foyle school library scheme.

Garfield Weston Foundation

The Garfield Weston Foundation is a family founded grant-maker that gives money to support a wide range of charities across the UK that make a positive difference working in different sectors. These include welfare, youth, community, environment, education, health, arts, heritage and faith.

Karbon Homes – Community Funding

Karbon Homes have a Community Investment Fund and welcome applications from not-for-profit organisations and schools. The grants aim to support projects that make a real difference to people's lives and wellbeing within the communities in which they work.

Key Fund

Key Fund provide social investment to organisations, enabling growth and sustainability for communities most in need. They provide flexible loans and grants to help enterprises start up, become sustainable and grow.

Livin

Livin are a housing provider that has community funding for projects that will help tenants and the communities they live in. They are particularly interested in projects that will help with financial inclusion and making your community safer, greener and more sustainable.

[National Lottery Heritage Fund](#)

The National Lottery Heritage Fund provide different levels of funding to heritage of all shapes and sizes. Their grants range from £10,000 up to millions of pounds.

[Northern Powergrid Foundation](#)

Grants of up to £20,000 are available from Northern Powergrid Foundation for organisations in the Northern Powergrid area. The fund is for projects that support energy resilience initiatives and helps those located in our local communities who are most affected by changes in the economy, environment and society because of the shifting energy landscape.

[Northstar Ventures](#)

Northstar Ventures provide early-stage venture capital and impact investments to entrepreneurs with big ideas. They have a range of funds and programmes available.

[Sir James Knott Trust](#)

Sir James Knott Trust support charitable activity in Tyne & Wear, Northumberland, County Durham and Hartlepool by making grants to organisations. They operate on a rolling programme.

[Screwfix Foundation](#)

Screwfix Foundation currently offers local registered charities and not-for-profit organisations funding up to the region of £5,000 to support projects that improve, repair and maintain homes and community facilities used by those in need throughout the UK.

[Sport England](#)

Sport England invest National Lottery and public money to help people play sport and take part in physical activity. They have a range of funding programmes available.

[Suez Communities Fund](#)

The Suez Communities Fund supports community and environmental projects through the Landfill Communities Fund, distributing funds contributed by SUEZ Recycling and Recovery UK. You need to be in an eligible geographical area checked on their website.

[The Clothworkers Foundation](#)

The Clothworkers' Foundation improves the lives of people and communities – particularly those facing disadvantage and marginalization – through grant-making. The Foundation awards capital grants to charities registered in the UK or not-for-profit organisations working across their nine areas of priority defined in its Main and Small Grants programmes.

[The National Lottery Community Fund Awards for All](#)

This programme offers funding from £300 to £20,000 and can support your project for up to two years.

Eligible projects will need to do at least one of these things: bring people together to build strong relationships in and across communities, improve the places and spaces that matter to communities help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage support people, communities and organisations facing more demands and challenges because of the cost-of-living crisis.

[The National Lottery Community Fund Reaching Communities](#)

The Reaching Communities programme offers a larger amount of funding (over £10,000). The fund supports projects and organisations which aim to build strong relationships in and across communities, improve the places and spaces that matter to communities and help more people to reach their potential, by supporting them at the earliest possible stage.

[Veolia Environmental Trust](#)

Veolia Environmental Trust support community and environmental projects across England through the Landfill Communities Fund using money provided to them by Veolia. You need to be in an eligible geographical area which can be checked on the website.

[VCSE Energy Efficiency Scheme](#)

The VCSE Energy Efficiency Scheme is offering independent energy assessments to help identify energy-saving opportunities in your building. From January, the scheme has also be offering capital grants to implement measures recommended in your assessment.

Funding Searches

Durham County Council manage a funding portal called [Durham4Community](#) for community groups which you can sign up to for free. It allows you to search for funding schemes available to your group, apply for funding and get advice on producing your funding application.

Durham Community Action Funding Top Tips

Before starting your application, please read through our 'top tips' to make sure that you have all of the information you need and that you have a plan before you contact them.

1. **Always check the funder's exclusions list**
2. **Make sure you meet the funder's priorities/criteria**
3. **Be clear and concise**
4. **Only provide information you have been asked for** Most funders will ask for your governing document and bank account details
5. **Be clear about why your project is needed and who will benefit from it**
6. **Know your outcomes and what difference your project will make**
7. **Provide an accurate budget**
8. **Complete application forms fully and accurately**
9. **Get someone else to read your application before you send it**
10. **Meet funders deadlines and timescales**
