



Grant Funding to Improve Energy Efficiency in County Durham Community Buildings

There are a number of funds that may be appropriate for helping community groups and organisations purchase and install energy efficiency measures for their community building.

This note lists those grant/ loan programmes that may be appropriate for community groups in County Durham.

Please note

- many of the funds listed below will require the energy efficiency works to be included as part of a bigger project that is seeking to refurbish, extend or develop a community building for the use and enjoyment of more members of the local community.
- programmes listed are based on online information provided by the funder at the time the document was produced. They may be subject to change at short notice.

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1. Banks Community Fund (up to £5,000)

The Banks Community Fund (LCF) supports local community and environmental projects around the geographic areas in which its projects are located. Funding is available for various projects, including building, improving and maintaining community buildings or amenities.

NB to be eligible for a grant, the building must be open to the community, with public access for a minimum of four evenings per week, two days per week or 104 days per year.

Who can apply?

Typically, the grants are available for:

- constituted voluntary-led organisations with charitable aims,
- registered charities
- charitable incorporated organisations (CIO)
- social enterprises
- community interest companies (CIC)
- companies limited by guarantee that have charitable aims

Applicants should consult the [Banks map](#) to ensure their project is located within an area where the Banks Group is currently operating.

When to apply

The remaining 2021 deadlines for submitting completed applications are as follows:

- **Friday 3rd September 2021**
- **Friday 12th November 2021**

2. Banks Renewables & Mining Funds (£3,000 per year)

This programme, which is administered by the County Durham Community Foundation, funds local community groups, voluntary organisations and environmental projects within the boundaries of Banks Renewables wind farms and Banks Mining surface coal mines. The programme which specifically relates to an area in County Durham is:

- **Bradley Community Fund** which aims to support projects and groups operating in the area surrounding Bradley surface coal mine, i.e. Leadgate, Medomsley and Dipton in County Durham.

Projects generally last up to 12 months.

NB if your application is successful you will be required to pay 10% of the amount awarded to the Banks Group, prior to your grant being released.

Who can apply?

Community groups, voluntary organisations and environmental projects that are charitable, educational, philanthropic or benevolent in purpose can apply to the Fund. This includes but is not restricted to:

- Playgroups
- Youth clubs
- Sports clubs and facilities
- The Scout and Guide Movement
- Senior citizens clubs and activities
- Village halls
- Church halls
- Local charities that benefit local people
- Environmental projects
- Schools (for non-statutory projects)
- Education, employment, training & skills development for unemployed people

When to apply

Apply online using the County Durham Community Foundation application form. There are normally 4 deadlines per year – in early February, June, September and November. Applications are generally assessed within 12 weeks.

3. Bernard Sunley Charitable Foundation (£1,000 - £20,000+)

Bernard Sunley offers funding towards capital projects such as new buildings, extensions, refurbishments and recreational spaces. This could include grants towards the building or refurbishment of scout huts, village halls, community centres, youth clubs, boxing clubs, outdoor activity centres, farm and outdoor learning centres, sports centres and pavilions, playing fields and playgrounds.

The preference is to support projects related to the fabric of a building, rather than non-durable items subject to wear and tear such as furniture or appliances.

They offer three levels of grants. These are

- **Large grants (£20,000 and above)**
- **Medium grants (up to £20,000)**
- **Small grants (£5,000 and under)**

Projects must have total costs of between £5,000 and £5M.

Please note that although applicants can indicate how much grant they would like to request, the actual amount awarded is decided by the Foundation. Most grants range from £1,000 to £5,000.

Examples of previously supported projects include:

- Norton Village Hall received a £5,000 grant for heating improvements
- Llangrove Village Hall received £5,000 towards the replacement of windows
- Goathland Community Hub & Sports Pavilion C.I.O was awarded £3,000 towards solar panels
- Sedbergh People's Hall received £5,000 towards a roof replacement
- 22nd Burton-on-Trent (St Mark's) Scout Group received £2,000 towards the re-wiring of the scout hut

Who can apply?

Charities or CIOs (Charitable Incorporated Organisations) registered in England and Wales.

Certain organisations with 'exempt' status which are places of worship, specialist schools, scout and guide groups, hospices, museums, galleries, heritage centres, housing associations and community benefit societies.

Application process

Apply online at the Bernard Sunley website. The process starts with a general eligibility check.

Small grants are agreed by Trustees on a monthly basis. Large and medium grants are considered and agreed upon at Trustees' meetings. The Foundation aims to make a decision on applications within six months.

4. Biffa Awards – Main Grant Scheme (£10,000 - £75,000)

Biffa's Main Grant Scheme awards funding to projects under the themes of 1) Community Buildings, 2) Rebuilding Biodiversity, 3) Recreation and 4) Partnership.

The Community Buildings theme seeks to provide and improve community buildings such as village halls, community centres and church halls to increase the range of services that can be offered to the community and to improve community involvement. Priority is given to projects that enhance, maintain or introduce real community led social, economic or environmental improvements. To be eligible, the building must be open to the public for at least 104 days per year.

Please note that applications for the repair or maintenance of churches must be able to demonstrate wider community benefit.

Examples of eligible project costs that can be funded under the Community Buildings category include building refurbishment and internal fit-out costs, kitchen replacement (including white goods), internal furniture, window and door replacement, central heating systems and roof replacement.

An example of a previously supported project is Chapel FM Arts Centre in East Leeds which was awarded £30,923 to install ground source heating to create zero emissions and reduce the organisation's energy bills.

Please note Biffa Award is unable to fund energy saving or green technology based projects which have a derived income, e.g. solar panels.

Grants are available between £10,000 and £75,000 for eligible projects that have total costs of less than £200,000. Please note that applicants need to find a third party contributor(s) to provide 10% of the grant for which they are applying.

Who can apply?

This fund is aimed at not-for-profit organisations.

To be eligible, projects must be based within 5 miles of a significant Biffa operation or within 10 miles of an active Biffa Landfill site (e.g. East Durham and Durham City are eligible due to their proximity to the Houghton le Spring landfill site).

Application process

The fund follows a 2 stage application process:

1. An **Expression of Interest** can be submitted at any time.
2. If approved, the applicant is then invited to submit a **Full Application** which will be assessed at one of the Board meetings, which are held 4 times a year, i.e. in February, May, July and November.

NB it can take up to 6 months to hear if a project has been successful.

5. Clothworkers' Foundation Open Grants Programme (up to approx.. £25,000)

The Clothworkers' Foundation offers one-off capital grants to improve the lives of people and communities. This can include the purchase, construction, renovation and/or refurbishment of buildings that are used for work around at least one of the following themes: Alcohol & Substance Misuse; People with Disabilities; Disadvantaged Minority Communities; Disadvantaged Young People; Domestic & Sexual Abuse; Older People; Homelessness; Prisoners & Ex-offenders; and Visual Impairment.

NB support is not available to arts or education projects unless they work exclusively with people from one of the aforementioned groups.

They fund both large and small projects. The size of grant awarded will depend on a number of factors including the size of your organisation and the cost and scale of your capital project.

An example of a previously supported project is:

The Victoria Centre, a meeting place for the multi-cultural and multi-faith community of Wellingborough, Northamptonshire was awarded a grant of £10,000 in 2011, towards the cost of replacing its 30 year-old boiler, which was declared unsafe and beyond repair.

Without heating they had been forced to cancel sessions for children and elderly residents, and it was proving impossible for the facility to remain open during winter months. The Centre now has an energy efficient heating system, which benefits staff and over 1000 local people each week.

Who can apply?

The Foundation can support UK charities that are registered with Charity Commission including CIO; Companies Limited by Guarantee without capital share (CIC); and charities exempt from HMRC Tax.

It will not fund religious institutions unless the project is open to all and does not involve the advancement of faith.

NB Village Halls or community centres/ hubs cannot be supported unless they are operating in an area of high deprivation (according to the current Indices of Deprivation)

Application process

Applications can be submitted online at any time.

Applicants need to pass an online eligibility quiz before submitting the online application form.

Decisions on smaller grants (less than £10,000) are normally made within eight weeks, and on larger grants (more than £10,000) within six months.

6. County Durham Foundation Community Grants Programme (up to £5,000)

The County Durham Community Foundation administers a variety of grants on behalf of a range of funders, including the Banks Funds and the Wind Farm Community Benefit Funds which are listed separately.

The general aim of the Community Grants Programme is to support projects and activities that will provide clear benefits for the local community.

It offers grants of between £1,001 and £5,000 to established charities, voluntary-led organisations and projects that have potential to make an incredible impact in their community.

In the light of COVID-19, the Fund guidelines have been changed to be more flexible to support communities and organisations facing the sizeable challenges ahead. The Fund's aim is to give opportunities for development and growth but prioritise work that sustains the health, wellbeing, and opportunities of local communities.

Who can apply?

Any suitably constituted not-for-profit group can apply for funding (applicants do not need to be registered charities to apply). This includes:

- Voluntary led organisations with charitable aims
- Registered charities and charitable incorporated organisations (CIOs)
- Social enterprises
- Community interest companies (CICs)

Applications can be submitted online at any time. They are generally assessed within 8 weeks.

7. Foyle Foundation Small Grants (£1,000 – £10,000)

Aims to support smaller charities in the UK, especially those working at grass roots and local community level, in any field, across a wide range of activities.

One year grants of between £1,000 and £10,000 are available to charities which can demonstrate that such a grant will make a significant difference to their work. This can include capital applications for community buildings works/ improvements (which may include energy efficiency measures) that are expected to provide a significant benefit for the local community.

Projects/proposals that help reduce fixed or variable costs or which enable the generation of higher income or additional revenue streams will be considered including building or smaller capital projects that can promote efficiency savings, reduce costs, improve energy efficiency, or help generate higher revenues.

Previously supported activities include: community building refurbishments and renovations, replacing a heating system, installing eco-friendly heating, re-wiring a village hall, insulating a theatre roof, installing a Solar Photovoltaic system, and replacing the boiler and radiators at a meeting hut.

COVID implications - at present, it will not be a priority to consider building projects unless these are for essential repairs or re-equipping, in order for you to carry out your work more efficiently or cost effectively and where you can demonstrate why there is an immediate need to carry out these works.

NB the grants are offered merely as a contribution towards total project costs – the applicant will need to have also secured funding from other sources.

Who can apply

Charities with an annual turnover of less than £150,000 per annum can apply.

The Foundation does not accept applications from Community Interest Companies or Social Enterprises.

Application process

There are no set deadlines, so applications can be submitted at any time. Decisions are normally made within 4 months.

8. Garfield Weston Foundation (£1,000 - £30,000)

The Foundation can support a wide range of projects led by organisations committed to making a positive impact to the lives of the communities in which they work. This can include capital grants for the restoration of village halls and community centres. They are particularly interested in the environmental impact of such capital projects.

Although the general rule for Capital projects is to apply for **up to 10% of the total costs**, for Capital projects that benefit local communities (e.g. repairs and refurbishments of village halls, community centres, places of worship, schools etc) they will typically receive **under £30,000** regardless of project size.

The Trustees expect that you have raised approximately half of the costs before applying and can demonstrate significant local fundraising as this shows that the project is valued by the community.

Grants are generally provided for one year.

Who can apply?

Organisations eligible to apply include: UK registered charities, Charitable Incorporated Organisations (CIOs) and churches.

The Foundation is unlikely to fund organisations such as social enterprises or Community Interest Companies (CICs).

Application process

Applications can be submitted either online or via the post at any time. Full information can be found on the website. Decisions are normally made within 4 months.

9. Postcode Neighbourhood Trust (£500 - £20,000)

The Postcode Neighbourhood Trust is a grant-giving body funded by players of People's Postcode Lottery. It provides funding for smaller charities and good causes in the North of England. One of its priority themes is “responding to the climate emergency and promoting sustainability”.

NB the Trust does not support building renovations or general refurbishments.

Projects should be delivered within a 12 month period.

Who can apply

Registered charities in England, Scotland & Wales can apply from £500 - £20,000
Other constituted not for profit organisations may apply for up to £2,000 for community based projects.

Application process

Organisations may apply using the online application form which will be available for each funding round.

In 2021 there will be a funding round each month from 1st February up to (and including) 1st October.

10. Rank Foundation Pebble Grants (up to £66,666)

This programme is aimed at UK registered charities and recognised churches that are raising money for capital projects which require building work, refurbishment or the purchase of long-term equipment to benefit the local community.

Total project costs must be less than £1million, and applicants must have already raised a third of these costs.

Who can apply

Smaller UK registered charities and recognised churches with an annual income of less than £500,000 can apply.

Application Process

Apply online using their Capital Costs Grant Application. There are no set deadlines – applications are considered by trustees' meetings which are held throughout the year.

NB PEBBLE GRANTS ARE TEMPORARILY CLOSED – DUE TO REOPEN AT SOME POINT IN 2021.

11. Reaching Communities England (£10,000+ for up to 5 years)

The National Lottery Community Fund's Reaching Communities Programme supports organisations who want to take action on issues that matter to people and communities, and have ideas that enable communities to thrive.

Projects must address one or more of the following funding priorities:

- Bringing people together and building strong relationships in and across communities
- Improving the places and spaces that matter to communities
- Enabling more people to fulfil their potential by working to address issues at the earliest possible stage.

NB they are currently particularly keen to support people and communities most adversely impacted by Covid-19.

The programme can fund project activities, operating costs, organisational development and capital costs.

Grants are available from £10,000 upwards and funding can last for up to 5 years.

Who can apply?

Applicants can be a:

- voluntary and community organisation
- registered charity or charitable incorporated organisation (CIO)
- group of organisations, as long as they are led by a voluntary and community organisation
- school
- statutory body (including *local authorities*, town, parish or community council)
- not for profit company including companies limited by guarantee and Community Interest Companies with two or more directors

Projects must be designed for and by the community.

Application process

The programme follows a two-stage application process. In the first instance, applicants need to submit a brief outline of their project. This can be done using the online form, by email, or by sending the funder a video. If the project idea is accepted, the applicant will then be invited to submit a full proposal.

12. Rothley Trust (£100 - £1,000)

The Rothley Trust gives small grants to assist groups with charitable work in the North East. It focuses on the needs of children and young people in areas of disadvantage and also supports community development and those groups which help people with disabilities.

The trust can help small charities and voluntary groups operating in the North East to reduce their energy bills and offers grants of £100 – £1,000 for small energy saving items such as roof insulation, radiator thermostats, blinds and curtains, energy efficient equipment, double glazing, timer switches etc.

Grants are generally made for specific projects such as the purchase of equipment or the provision, refurbishment or repair of premises but the trust will **not** fund large projects such as solar panels and wind turbines.

Who can apply?

Registered charities, community interest companies and voluntary groups in Northumberland, Tyne & Wear, Durham and Cleveland are eligible to apply.

(NB voluntary groups must be properly constituted and must find a registered charity to act as a cheque handler).

Priority is given to organisations operating in disadvantaged areas and dealing with needs of people who have difficulties or disabilities. Also local community groups at grass roots level who require support.

How to apply

Applications should be made by submitting an appeal letter, preferably via email. The website sets out what information this letter needs to include. As a guide two sides of A4 should be sufficient.

Grants are awarded at quarterly meetings in February, May, August and November. The deadlines for submitting applications are normally the month prior to these grant meetings.

13. Rural Community Buildings Loan Fund (£15,000 ave.)

A £700,000 DEFRA fund run by ACRE can help community groups renovate, refurbish and construct rural buildings such as village halls, church halls and community centres. This can include activities to improve energy efficiency, for example improving a building's insulation, adding photo-voltaic panels, ground source heat pumps, air source heat pumps, sensor and timer switches on lights and heaters, energy saving lights and water saving taps.

The average size for a loan is normally £15,000 and projects must show that they can attract some local funding or other funding sources.

The loans, plus interest, are repaid using a straightforward, flexible payment system over a period of 5 to 8 years.

Approximately 10-14 new loans are approved each year.

Who can apply?

Community groups responsible for community buildings in rural England.

How to apply

Potential applicants need to contact ACRE for further information on and to start the application process.

14. **Sir James Knott Trust (average grants up to £4,500)**

The aim of Sir James Knott Trust is to help improve the conditions of people living and working in the North East of England. Funding is available for a wide range of projects, including those addressing community issues and events. The Trust particularly welcomes projects relating to military and maritime organisations, youth clubs, and projects that can help the elderly, education and training.

Two levels of grant are available:

- Under £1,000 – the average grant awarded is £700
- Over £1,000 - the average grant awarded is £4,500

The Trust offers funding as a contribution towards total project costs (it does not offer 100% funding).

An example of a previously supported project within the Community Issues theme is as follows:

WW1 Memorial Hall in Boulmer - the Trust awarded a grant of £5,000 to help with the costs of a major renovation project. The hall, a former First World War barrack hut, was very difficult to keep warm and the exterior of the building had become unsightly. The villagers came together to make the project happen and the hall is now '*very warm and cozy and no longer an eyesore.*'

A number of community buildings have also been awarded small grants (£1,000 - £2,500) to install solar or photovoltaic panels to generate their own electricity and help reduce their utility bills.

Who can apply?

Grants are normally made to charities, community groups and social enterprises that can demonstrate that their aims have identifiable public benefit and that they operate in, or for the benefit of Tyne and Wear, Northumberland and County Durham including Hartlepool.

Most charitable organisations are eligible to apply, however the Trust can only make payments to registered charities.

Application process

Apply online. Applications for funding under £1,000 can be submitted at any time and are normally processed within 6 weeks.

For larger grants, Trustees meet 3 times a year to consider applications, usually in spring, summer and autumn. Applications over £10,000 normally require a visit from an assessor or a member of Trust staff team. It is advisable to allow 3-4 months for your application to be processed.

15. Screwfix Foundation (up to £5,000)

The Screwfix Foundation accepts applications from charities and not for profit organisations for projects that will fix, repair, maintain and improve the properties and community facilities of those in need by reason of financial hardship, sickness, disability, distress or other disadvantage throughout the UK.

Grants of up to £5,000 are available for all kinds of projects, from repairing buildings and improving facilities in deprived areas, to decorating the homes of people living with sickness and disabilities.

Who can apply

To be eligible, an organisation MUST:

- Be a registered Charity or Not for Profit organisation
- Help those in need. This could be by reason of financial hardship, sickness, distress or other disadvantages in the UK
- Be looking for funding to support projects that relate to the repair, maintenance, improvement or construction of homes, community buildings and other buildings.

How to apply

Applications can be made at any time using the online form. They will be reviewed on a quarterly basis, i.e. in March, June, September and December.

16. The Theatre Trust's Theatre Improvement Scheme (up to £20,000)

The Theatre Improvement Scheme currently offers grants up to £20,000 for theatre operators to improve the environmental sustainability of their theatres. Funding can support a range of projects that consider different ways theatre buildings can reduce their environmental impact. This might range from building management systems to more efficient water heaters, or a green roof to new windows.

Who can apply?

The scheme is open to theatre operators who can demonstrate that they:

- own or manage theatres with titles or signed leases of more than 5 years on buildings in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland
- run a year-round programme of live performance, of no less than 30 performances a year
- have a bona fide UK charitable or not-for-profit legal structure and be able to provide certified or audited accounts for at least two years
- operate theatres that achieve excellence through their producing and programming or architectural significance

How to apply?

The funding is being made available through the Theatres Trust in partnership with the Wolfson Foundation. A copy of the application form is available online. It should be completed and submitted by email to grants@theatrust.org.uk.

There is one funding round per year. The next closing date for applications is 12 noon on the **6th September 2021**.

17. Tudor Trust (no funding limits specified – they try to accommodate an applicant’s need)

The Tudor Trust makes grants to smaller community-led groups that support people at the margins of society and seek to make a positive difference to their lives and communities. They seek to be an open and accessible funder and are therefore quite flexible over what they will fund.

Most funding is awarded for core costs, although they can also support capital costs for buildings or equipment that have potential to make a significant difference to the local community that will use them.

There are no set upper or lower grant limits, although most grants awarded tend to be for over £10,000.

Who can apply?

Organisations that undertake charitable work and have both a constitution and a bank account are eligible to apply. This can include registered charities, unincorporated associations, community interest companies, and industrial and provident societies. (Most grants are awarded to smaller groups, i.e. those with annual income of less than £500,000).

Application process

The Trust uses a 2 stage application process:

- Stage 1 involves completing an application form.
- Stage 2 involves the Tudor Trust seeking clarification and additional information from applicants via a telephone call or site visit.

Stage 1 applications can be submitted online at any time (please note that on average it takes around 4 months for a project to be approved).

18. Veolia Environmental Trust Community Grants (£10,000 to £75,000)

The Veolia Environmental Trust is a Distributive Environmental Body that awards grants as part of the Landfill Communities Fund (LCF) to create or improve community facilities or outside spaces for the benefit of the community.

The type of activities that can be supported include community buildings and rooms, such as: Community centres, Village halls, Community spaces within religious buildings, and Scout or Girl guiding buildings, Sports pavilions or changing rooms.

For example, the programme has previously supported community centre refurbishments that have involved improving the lighting; rewiring; installing energy-efficiency radiators; replacing wooden framed, singled glazed windows with PVC, double glazed ones; and installing a new, more efficient boiler.

NB the programme will **NOT** fund renewable energy projects to access feed-in tariffs e.g. solar panels.

The maximum grant is £75,000 for projects with a total cost up to £250,000 (including VAT and professional costs). Projects need to have already secured at least 10% of the total cost in cash before submitting their Stage 1 bid.

Who can apply?

Constituted, not-for-profit organisations and local authorities within the vicinity of a qualifying Veolia site can apply – e.g. there is a qualifying site at Ferryhill. There is a postcode checker on the website for applicants to check if they are within the catchment area.

Application process

The funder adopted a one stage application process on 4th February 2021.

To apply for a grant, you will need to complete an online application form.

There are four funding calls issued per year. The exact dates can be found on the Veolia Trust website.

19. William Leech Charity (grants up to £1,000 & loans up to £10,000)

The mission statement for the William Leech Charity is *“To encourage the improvement of the physical, mental, spiritual and economic quality of life for people in the North East of England through the support of charitable organisations which aspire to high ethical standards and to the highest standards in their field.”*

Grants up to £1,000, and loans up to £10,000 can be provided for a wide range of capital or revenue projects.

Who can apply?

Applications are only accepted from registered charities, normally for projects to be delivered in the counties of Northumberland, Tyne and Wear and Durham.

Application process

Applications should be submitted online using the ‘Apply Now’ link on the website. (Applications will no longer be accepted by post).

20. Wind Farm Community Benefits Fund...

Community groups and projects can apply for grants for capital items, improvements to community buildings, biodiversity and habitat conservation projects, energy conservation and community based or led projects. This can range from projects to improve public amenities e.g. community halls, sports facilities to energy efficiency or renewable energy projects.

The fund is geographically focused, as follows:

a. East Durham (grants up to £5,000)

Who can apply

This fund is open to charities, voluntary, community groups, town and parish councils, schools and educational establishments, social enterprises (including credit unions, co-operatives, social firms, and community owned enterprises, community interest companies and development trusts) provided they operate on a not-for-profit basis and have projects that support communities in areas or villages, generally within a 3 mile radius of the eligible wind farm.

21. 1989 Willan Charitable Trust (£750 - £10,000)

The trust offers support to projects seeking to ease social deprivation and/ or enrich the fabric of the local community and the quality of life of individuals within that community. Grants are available to support organisations' core costs, as well as discreet projects. This can include projects that meet the needs of communities experiencing high levels of deprivation, and projects that will assist local communities affected by crime and anti-social behaviour. The grants generally range from £750 to £10,000.

Who can apply?

Applications are welcomed from registered charities based in, or benefitting, residents of Tyne & Wear, Northumberland, County Durham and Teesside. Priority is given to those which ease social deprivation and/or enrich the fabric of the local community and the quality of life of individuals within that community.

Community and voluntary groups that are not able to register as charities may apply for a Willan grant. However such applications must include a letter of support from a suitable registered charity (e.g. a local CVS) which is willing to hold the grant on their behalf.

Application process

Applications should be submitted online via the funder's website.

The trustees meet in March, June, September and December to consider applications.
